

# A Message from Father Francis



# Gospel: John 11.1-45 - The Raising of Lazarus

My Dear Friends In Christ,

It seems a bit strange to have this gospel on the Fifth Sunday of Lent. It seems to be clearly about the resurrection and yet we are still plodding through Lent and have to get through Good Friday before we get to Easter. What's going on; have the Church's liturgical engineers got it all wrong? Can I suggest that this text is more about death than resurrection? After all, Lazarus isn't walking around today; he had to undergo

another death. This text is more about our life and death here and now rather than about the resurrection. We will have time enough to consider the resurrection when we get to Easter Sunday and the weeks of celebration afterward.

In today's Gospel we encounter the great mystery of the raising of Lazarus from the dead. This apparent death of Lazarus was not in vain for Jesus says it occurred so "that the Son of God may be glorified through it." After raising Lazarus from the dead, Jesus instructs the crowd to "unbind him, and let him go"

This "unbinding" signifies that Jesus doesn't just raise him from the dead but also sets him free. So too, through God's great gift of forgiveness, He raises us from the death of sin and leads us to interior freedom. This Lent, let us seek God's forgiveness by availing ourselves to the sacrament of Reconciliation before Easter. The Catechism says that "the sacrament of Reconciliation with God brings about a true "spiritual resurrection," restoration of the dignity and blessings of the life of the children of God, of which the most precious is friendship with God" (CCC 1468).



Moreover, after Lazarus was freed it says that many people believed in Jesus. Likewise, after we receive God's for-

giveness and live in freedom and friendship with God, we should be true stewards of God's gifts and evangelize those around us. Through the grace of the sacrament, we will have the necessary strength to offer our time and talents to our parish community. So this Lent let us not remain in the death of sin but turn to Jesus and receive the life and freedom of forgiveness.

The raising of Lazarus shows the fullness of who Jesus is. He shows deep compassion for Mary and Martha on the loss of their brother. And this grief touch his own heart and he weeps openly. He wants to do something. His prayer to his Father precedes the resuscitation of Lazarus. And when Lazarus comes from the tomb, Jesus commands those around to unbind him and set him free. He wanted Lazarus as he does us to have life and life to the fullest. This gospel story does point to the resurrection of Jesus but it points more to the person and the power of Jesus to bring life out of death.

This Lent, let us seek God's forgiveness by availing ourselves to the sacrament of Reconciliation before Easter. Through the grace of the sacrament, we will have the necessary strength and grace to offer our time and talents to our parish community and to those in need.



Come Join in the Eastern European Custom of "Święconka" When: Holy Saturday Morning, March 30 at 9:30 a.m // Where: St. Pius X Narthex

**The Old Custom:** The blessing of the Easter food, or the "Święconka" is a tradition dear to the heart of many Eastern European people. They are grateful to God for all His gifts of both nature and grace, and as a token of this gratitude, have the food of their table sanctified with the hope that Spring, the season of the Resurrection, will also be blessed by God's goodness and mercy.

## The New Custom: Join Father Francis for this traditional Blessing of the Baskets of Easter Foods.

- A typical basket brought for blessing might include hard-boiled eggs, butter, cheese, a piece of cooked meat, bread or coffee cake, a few Easter sweets, and a container of salt. (The salt can be used to cook with all year.)
  - Put the food in a basket and cover it with a cloth.
  - The whole family can participate and help prepare.
  - Food is then eaten on Easter Sunday.

## **Easter Food Symbolism:**

The foods in the baskets have a symbolic meaning:

- Eggs indicate new life and Christ's resurrection from the tomb.
- Bread symbolic of Jesus, the Bread of Life.
- Butter often in the shape of a lamb, symbolic of Christ the Pascal Lamb.
- Salt a vital element in our physical life, represents purification.
- Meat symbolic of joy and abundance, and God's generosity.

# Seder Passover Meal - March 27

You are invited to attend a Passover Seder meal, on Wednesday, March 27 following the 5pm Mass. The Seder meal is the traditional Passover meal to remember the suffering and persecution of the Jewish people in Egypt and the miraculous way that God brought them out of slavery.

During this meal we will engage with the traditional foods of Passover, and the meanings behind them. This experience can help us prepare for Easter by deepening our understanding of Passover and the way that it set the stage for Jesus, the Lamb of God.



# Understanding Liturgy: Holy Week (Part I) By Charlie Dispenzieri

he celebrations of Holy Week help us to focus on the fact that "the days of his saving Passion and glorious Resurrection are approaching" (Preface II of the Passion of the Lord, Roman Missal). Here is a brief overview of the many celebrations that occur during Holy Week:

Holy Week begins with the celebration of Palm Sunday of the Passion of The Lord. Palm branches, are ancient symbols of hope, victory and new life, so they are a part of our Palm Sunday celebration. The gospel proclaimed on Palm Sunday celebrates the Lord's triumphant entrance into Jerusalem where he was welcomed by crowds worshiping him and laying down palm leaves before him. Together we too, will carry palm branches, and join in the proclamation of the gospel.

The Chrism Mass is celebrated on Tuesday at the cathedral in Indianapolis. During this Mass, the holy oils that will be used throughout the coming year are blessed by the archbishop. All the priests of the archdiocese also renew publicly their priestly promises.

The summit of the Liturgical Year is the Easter Triduum—from the evening of Holy Thursday to the evening of Easter Sunday. Though chronologically three days, they are liturgically one day unfolding for us the unity of Christ's Paschal Mystery (Jesus' life, death and resurrection). The single celebration of the Triduum marks the end of the Lenten season, and leads to the Mass of the Resurrection of the Lord at the Easter Vigil. The liturgical services that take place during the Triduum are The Mass of the Lord's Supper, Good Friday of the Lord's Passion and The Mass of the Resurrection of the Lord.

The Mass of the Lord's Supper (Holy Thursday) commemorates the institution of the Eucharist and the priesthood, as well as Jesus' command to love and serve one another. At this Mass, Fr Fran-

cis will receive the Holy Oils that were blessed by our archbishop. The connection between the Eucharist and living a life of service is ritualized by the Washing of Feet. The Ceremonial of Bishops (CB) sets the context in no. 297: "This Mass is, first of all, the memorial of the institution of the Eucharist. It is also the memorial of the institution of the priesthood, by which Christ's mission and sacrifice are perpetuated in the world. In addition, this Mass is the memorial of that love by which the Lord loved us even to death" (CB # 297).

During the Mass of the Lord's Supper, Fr Francis will consecrate enough hosts for this Mass and also enough for the following day's celebration, since the Passion of the Lord is the only day in the liturgical year where a Mass is not to be celebrated. Following Communion, the transfer of the Blessed Sacrament begins with a procession to the Narthex. All present are part of this procession as we prepare to spend a period of time with The Lord in adoration until 12 midnight. There is no formal or specific dismissal to the Mass on this night, emphasizing that the liturgies of the Sacred Paschal Triduum are actually one continuous liturgy that spans over three days.

Next week we will continue providing a brief overview of the celebrations of the Sacred Paschal Triduum.
