A Message from Father Francis



My Dear Friends In Christ,

"He was oppressed and was afflicted, yet he opened not his mouth. Like a lamb that is led to the slaughter, and as a sheep before its shearers is dumb, so he opened not his mouth" (Is 53:7). For the followers of Christ, this Isaiah text evokes a response deep down within us, seeing how they apply to God's only beloved Son, and how he died for all of us. In the words of St Peter, "without having seen him you have come to believe in him, and so you are filled already with a joy so glorious that it cannot be described" (1 Pet 1:8). Without this sincere love of Christ, we are no true followers of his. We cannot say we fully love him, until we appreciate what he suffered for us.

Hearing the Passion narrative there is no real necessity to retrace in great detail the events there described. Christ was no stranger to hardship, deprivation and suffering, long before that final day of his life. "Being in the form of God," as St. Paul says, from the moment he came on earth, Jesus emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, becoming as human beings are (Phil 2:6f). He, the most high God, suffered the hardships of the poor, at

times not even having a place to lay his head. He endured hunger and thirst, and after long days surrounded by crowds seeking a cure, he often spent whole nights at prayer in the hills. Despite his compassion for all who came to him, he met with hatred and rejection, in particular from Pharisees and priests, who planned to have him killed. How this rejection and hatred must have grieved him. King Lear knew "How sharper than a serpent's tooth it is, to have a thankless child;" and how must Jesus have felt at being rejected by the people he had chosen, above all others.



So terrible was the inner struggle of Jesus as he faced his death, that in the garden his sweat became like drops of blood falling to the ground. Another bitter truth was the knowledge that one of his own circle of twelve would betray him, that most of the others would leave him, and that even the loyal St. Peter would repeatedly swear he had never met him. But most terrible of all was his feeling of being abandoned by God, his inner spirit shrouded in a darkness that reflected the murky darkness that enveloped Calvary as the end drew near. "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?"

There are moments in the lives of most Christians when they need desperately to cry out with Jesus: "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me", only to find, as Jesus did, that God is listening, and can reverse tragedy. It is above all a comfort to those who find it hard to bear the cross to know that it wasn't easy for God's own son, either.

When we look upon the passion and death of Jesus, we see a divine love that is stronger than sin, a divine light that shines in all our darkness, a divine power that brings new life out of all our deaths, a divine poverty that enriches us at the deepest level of our being.

Why such suffering? We can only say with Isaiah, "It was for our transgressions he was taken, for our sins he was brought low. It is important that some see our Lord's head bowed in dejection, while others observe his arms outstretched in forgiveness, and still others perceive, in the title on the cross, the proclamation of a reigning king. All these accounts combine together to give us food for thought and prayer. On him lay the punishment that brings us healing, through his wounds we are made whole" (53:5ff).

God, our Father, grant that your Son's suffering for us may not be in vain.

"Pilate again said to them, 'Then what shall I do with the an whom you call the King of the Jews?' And they cried out again, 'Crucify him.'" – MARK 15:12-13

Jesus told us "whatever you do for the least of my brothers, you do for me. "Every day we are presented opportunities to help someone. Every day we have the opportunity to see the face of Jesus in others and be the face of Jesus to others. Every day we pass by someone in need. Pray for the strength and courage to be the answer to someone's prayer.

Holy Week begins with Jesus entering triumphantly into Jerusalem. But Jesus must have entered with a heavy heart because it was obvious that authorities were out to get him. So it must have been especially irritating to the authorities to have the people welcome Jesus as a king into Jerusalem. The donkey was the animal a king used when he came in peace. So Jesus enters Jerusalem as the Messiah who brings peace. Even the people recognized this specialness about him. In response they covered the dirt pathway with palm branches and some of their clothing. They sang their Hosannas that is a prayer of petition: "Please save us now."

The Gospel for the Procession of Palms

When Jesus and his disciples drew near to Jerusalem to Bethphage and Bethany at the Mount of Olives, he sent two of his disciples and said to them, ""Go into the village opposite you and immediately after entering it, you will find a colt tethered on which no one has ever sat. Untie it and bring it here. If anyone should say to you 'Why are you doing this?' reply, 'The master has need of it and will send it back here at once.'" So they went off and found a colt tethered at a gate outside on the street and they untied it. Some of the bystanders said to them, "What are you doing, untying the colt?" They answered them Just as Jesus had told them to, and they permitted them to do it. So they brought the colt to Jesus and put their cloaks over it. Many spread their cloaks on the road and others spread leafy branches that they cut from the fields. Those preceding him as well as those following kept crying out: "Hosanna! Blessed is he whom comes in the name of the Lord! Blessed is the kingdom of our father David that is to come! Hosanna in the highest."

- 1. As you begin holy week, what are you going to do to be more conscious of the tragic events surrounding the betrayal, rejection and the crucifixion of Jesus?
- 2. The crowds were recognizing Jesus as Messiah on Sunday and many of the same people shouted to crucify him five days later. Was it a mob mentality or the fickleness of the human condition? How can I be more consistent in expressing what I believe?
- 3. What must have been going on in the hearts and minds of Jesus with the adulation of the crowds and the threats that awaited him in Jerusalem?
- 4. Jesus carries with him as Risen Lord the dreadful memories of what happened to him during Holy Week. Do I see in the Risen Lord someone who understands the hurt I feel at times, a sense of betrayal from those I love, the fear of dying, and the physical suffering I experience?

Come Join in the Eastern European Custom of "Święconka" When: Holy Saturday Morning, March 30 at 9:30 a.m // Where: St. Pius X Narthex

The Old Custom: The blessing of the Easter food, or the "Święconka" is a tradition dear to the heart of many Eastern European people. They are grateful to God for all His gifts of both nature and grace, and as a token of this gratitude, have the food of their table sanctified with the hope that Spring, the season of the Resurrection, will also be blessed by God's goodness and mercy.

The New Custom: Join Father Francis for this traditional Blessing of the Baskets of Easter Foods.

- A typical basket brought for blessing might include hard-boiled eggs, butter, cheese, a piece of cooked meat, bread or coffee cake, a few Easter sweets, and a container of salt. (The salt can be used to cook with all year.)
 - Put the food in a basket and cover it with a cloth.
 - The whole family can participate and help prepare.
 - Food is then eaten on Easter Sunday.

Easter Food Symbolism:

The foods in the baskets have a symbolic meaning:

- Eggs indicate new life and Christ's resurrection from the tomb.
- Bread symbolic of Jesus, the Bread of Life.
- Butter often in the shape of a lamb, symbolic of Christ the Pascal Lamb.
- Salt a vital element in our physical life, represents purification.
- Meat symbolic of joy and abundance, and God's generosity.

Seder Passover Meal - March 27

You are invited to attend a Passover Seder meal, on Wednesday, March 27 following the 5pm Mass. The Seder meal is the traditional Passover meal to remember the suffering and persecution of the Jewish people in Egypt and the miraculous way that God brought them out of slavery.

During this meal we will engage with the traditional foods of Passover, and the meanings behind them. This experience can help us prepare for Easter by deepening our understanding of Passover and the way that it set the stage for Jesus, the Lamb of God.



Understanding Liturgy: Holy Week (Part II) By Charlie Dispenzieri

Last week we began our overview of the liturgies of Holy Week. We examined the celebrations of Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord, the Chrism Mass, and The Mass of the Lord's Supper (Holy Thursday). Celebrating the liturgies of Holy Week allow us to experience through powerful rituals the same experiences Jesus and His Disciples walked on their profound journey.

On Good Friday (Friday of the Passion of the Lord) we gather together to prayerfully recall the Death of Jesus. The Holy Thursday Liturgy had no formal ending, and the Good Friday service has no formal beginning, offering us a unity between both celebrations. The service includes the Proclamation of the Passion, the Adoration of the Holy Cross, and a Communion service.

When the service does begin, it happens with the clergy prostrating themselves on the floor of the sanctuary while the rest of the assembly kneels. It is very striking with a noticeable silence to help us remember what we are celebrating. The Liturgy of the Word takes place with the Proclamation of the Lord's Passion. Following the homily, the Solemn Intercessions are proclaimed. These ten intercessions reveal the universality of our prayer, showing how important it is for the Church to spend an abundance of time pleading for the well-being of the entire world.

Next is The Adoration of the Holy Cross. The Church provides us the opportunity to show our sign of reverence to the cross with a simple genuflection, a kiss, a touch of the wood of the cross or a bow towards the cross. When adoration is finished, the distribution of Holy Communion begins. The liturgy ends as simply as it began. There is a brief dismissal, but no procession, giving everyone an opportunity to continue adoring the cross for as long as desired.

On Good Friday, we gather together for our Tenebrae Service at 8pm. The term Tenebrae means "darkness" in Latin. It refers to the public praying of the Liturgy of the Hours. It consists of prayers, readings, music and candles that will be extinguished throughout the service.

Holy Saturday morning is a time for the Church to wait at the Lord's tomb as we pray, fast and mediate on His Passion and Death as we await His Resurrection. We celebrate Morning Prayer with the Elect as they continue preparing for the Easter sacraments. We do not celebrate Mass during the day.

The climax of the Sacred Paschal Triduum, the Easter Vigil, begins after darkness has fallen. St. Augustine calls the Easter Vigil "The mother of all Vigils". The Universal Norms on the Liturgical Year (UNLY) teaches "The Sacred Paschal Triduum of the Passion and Resurrection of the Lord shines forth as the high point of the entire liturgical year (UNLY # 18). The Triduum ranks highest among the celebrations of the liturgical year.

The four parts of the Easter Vigil take us through a gradual unfolding of the Paschal Mystery of Christ. The First Part is the Solemn Beginning of the Vigil or Lucernarium. Outside in the Mary Garden, we stand by the blazing fire for the Blessing of the Fire and the Preparation of the Candle. This is followed by the Liturgy of the Word which reminds us how God is revealing to us His plan for salvation history. Next is the Baptismal Liturgy, which draws the elect through the waters of baptism into the promise of eternal life. We the faithful also renew our own baptismal promises. The newly baptized and those who are making a Profession of Faith will also celebrate the Sacrament of Confirmation. The Liturgy of the Eucharist is the climax of the Easter Vigil celebration. The newly initiated join for the first time with the faithful the receiving of The Lord's Body and Blood. Together we experience the presence of the Risen Lord within our midst.

On Easter Sunday, we renew our baptismal promises and are sprinkled with Holy Water to once again renew and refresh us. Pope Francis in Evangelii gaudium (EG) calls us to be an Alleluia people who evangelize with joy and connect our liturgy with our life. The Holy Father teaches "Evangelization with joy becomes beauty in the liturgy, as part of our daily concern to spread goodness" (EG # 24).

Celebrating each of these liturgies gives us an opportunity to enter into the mystery and presence of God each day as we experience the life, death and resurrection of Jesus.
