

A Letter from Father Francis

Seeking God within



My Dear Friends in Christ,

There are no programs or technology that automatically lead to God. Each one needs to follow one's own path to God, one's own way of opening oneself to the mystery underlying all things. But not everything equally favors an awakening of real faith.

There are people who never talk about God with anyone. Faith is a forbidden topic; God belongs to the private sphere. But even then they don't ever think about or remember God in the intimacy of their conscience. This attitude, frequent even among those who call themselves believers, can weaken faith. When something never gets remembered, it ends up dying of forgetfulness and starvation.

Others, on the contrary, seem very interested in religious things. They like to raise questions about God, creation, and the Bible.... They ask question after question but don't wait for answers. It seems not to interest them. Naturally, such words are empty if there's not a sincere seeking of God within. What's important isn't talking about "religious things", but making room for God in our own life.

Some people like to discuss religion. They don't know how to talk about God if it's not about defending their position and attacking anything different. In reality, all too often discussion about religious themes doesn't do anything except favor intolerance and the hardening of positions. However, whoever sincerely seeks God listens to the experience of those who believe in God and even the experience of those who have abandoned God. I have to find my path, but I'm interested in knowing where others find meaning, encouragement, and hope in dealing with our existence.

Whatever the case, what's most important to getting ourselves directed toward God is to call on God in the secret of the heart, alone, in the intimacy of one's conscience. That's where one opens self confidently to the mystery of God or where one decides to live alone, as an atheist, without God. Someone could say to me: "But how can I call on God if I don't believe in God or if I'm not sure of anything?" You can. That sincere calling amid darkness and doubt is probably one of the more pure and humble ways of opening ourselves to the Mystery and making ourselves sensitive to God's presence in the depth of our being.

The Gospel reminds us that there are sheep outside the fold, who live far from the believing community. But Jesus wants to lead these too. "They too will listen to my voice." Those who truly seek God listen sooner or later to the attraction of Jesus in the depths of their heart. At the beginning somewhat tentatively, later with more faith and trust, some day with deep joy.

The Lord has a life vocation for each of us. He calls us with our particular temperament, with the background specific to each of us. Each of us is unique. Parents know how distinct each of their children is. They will give the same love to all; they grow up in basically the same environment. Yet, from a very early age, their uniqueness becomes very evident. From the time of our baptism, we are each called to be the Lord's disciples, to follow the good Shepherd. However, the way we do that will be unique to each one of us. The particular way in which the Lord works through us is unique to each one of us. I can do something for the Lord that only I can do. Each person in this church can do something for the Lord that only he or she can do. Each of us has a unique contribution to make to the Lord's work in the world, and to the life of the church, and our input is just as vital as anyone else's. We each have a unique vocation and each one of us is vitally important to the Lord. When we respond to our unique vocation, we give a lift to everyone else. When

any one of us fails to respond to that vocation, we are all a bit impoverished.

When St. Peter tells how the stone rejected by the builders became the keystone of the building, he was referring to Jesus himself, the rejected Son of God. We can all feel rejected at times, for whatever reason. Yet, we are never rejected in the Lord's eyes. Our God sees us as just right for some aspect of his work. He



recognizes the potential for good that is within us all.

On this Vocations Sunday we can ask what the Good Shepherd wants of us right here and now.

Sheep and Shepherds

This Sunday we are invited to reflect on the image of Jesus the Good Shepherd. Jesus shepherds us, His flock, by protecting us from any ravaging dangers, helping us stay in the fold and seeking us when we're lost. We as sheep must listen to and obey His voice. There is a familiarity and closeness between a shepherd and his sheep, and so too, there is an intimacy between Jesus and us.


As stewards, we are called to imitate Jesus in all ways, including His role as shepherd. We all have people in our lives we are called to look out for, whether it be our families, friends or fellow parishioners. The most important step in effectively shepherding others is to first become a holy sheep in Jesus' flock. We must seek to grow in prayer and virtue, and through that flows the grace to journey with others heavenward.

Within this call for all of us to be shepherds, God gives a special grace to particular men to more closely imitate the Good Shepherd through the vocation of priesthood. In regards to vocations, Jesus gives us only one instruction: "to pray to the Lord of the harvest, that He may send more labor-

ers" (Matthew 9:38). Therefore, all of us have a role to play in fostering vocations. God continues to call priests, and through our prayers we can help young men answer the call. One great practice we can adopt is praying one Hail Mary every day for an increase in vocations.

Summary

As stewards, we are called to imitate Jesus in all ways, including His role as the Good Shepherd. The most important step in effectively shepherding others is to first become a holy sheep in Jesus' flock. God also calls many people to more closely shepherd His people in the priesthood and through our prayers, we can help young men answer the call.

"I am the good shepherd...and I lay down my life for the sheep...and they will heed my voice." - John 10:14-16

When you pray, do you only ask Jesus for the things that you want? Do you ever ask Jesus what He wants from you? How do you listen for His response? Many times Jesus responds in "quiet whispers" that are not so obvious. So, take time every day, in silence, to actively listen for His voice.

El Salvador Outreach Ministry


At the start of this year, I was blessed with the opportunity to return to El Salvador to visit

the Tamarindo community. My initial connection with this community in Guarjila was facilitated by Carol Wagner during my time at Bishop Chatard, where I participated in a cultural immersion trip in the spring of 2019. During that unforgettable journey, we dove into the rich tapestry of Salvadoran history, lived with host families, immersed ourselves in local customs, and forged deep bonds with the people we encountered. From celebrating Mass with the archbishop to a playful game of kickball and lively karaoke sessions, every moment was imbued with a profound sense of camaraderie and spiritual growth. It truly was the experience of a lifetime: learning about



the complicated history of El Salvador and being surrounded by people who continuously choose joy

Upon returning home, I felt a profound sense of loss and longing, sensing an unshakeable calling to return. Fortunately, in the fall of 2019, Mrs. Wagner facilitated a second trip to Guarjila, with the focus of bringing art projects for both the local elementary school and the Tamarindo community. This time around, we were more comfortable and were able to communicate and connect much deeper. It was on this trip, providing art initiatives, that I discerned my call to become an art therapist. Without this trip, I would not have experienced the powerful ability that art has to connect people without using language. Graduating from the University of Indianapolis with degrees in pre-art therapy and Spanish provided me with the perfect foundation to return to El Salvador in January and apply my studies in a practical setting. This trip, however, was markedly different from my earlier experiences in high school.





Tamarindo continues to stand as a beacon of hope, emphasizing the importance of faith, education, and community.

Reflecting on these experiences prompts me to consider how we can continue to extend our support to communities like the Tamarindo. These trips drastically changed the course of my life, igniting a passion for art therapy and social justice that continues to shape my path. As I continue on my journey to become an art therapist, I am inspired to explore avenues for using art as a tool for healing and empowerment. Additionally, I wholeheartedly encourage others to seize the opportunity to visit Guarjila if they can. The warmth and hospitality of the people will leave an indelible mark on your heart, and their unwavering love and resilience are a testament to the human spirit. By immersing ourselves in experiences like these, we not only enrich our own lives but also contribute to the collective pursuit of justice and solidarity.
